Medicare 101: What you Need to Know

SHEILA P. BURKE, R.N., M.P.A., F.A.A.N., is a faculty research fellow at the Malcolm Wiener Center for Social Policy and a member of the faculty at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. She is also a strategic advisor and chair of the government relations and public policy group, Baker, Donelson, Bearman, Caldwell & Berkowitz. Ms. Burke joined the Smithsonian Institution in 2000 as undersecretary for American museums and national programs and in 2004 became deputy secretary and chief operating officer, a position in which she served until September 2007. Ms. Burke was chief of staff to Sen. Bob Dole, from 1986 to 1996, when he was Senate minority and then the majority leader. In 1995, she was elected as secretary of the Senate, the chief administrative officer. From 1996 to 2000, she was executive dean and lecturer in public policy at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. Ms. Burke served as a member of the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission from 2000 to 2007, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Kaiser Family Foundation, serving as chair of the board from 2005 to 2008. Ms. Burke serves on the boards of The Chubb Corporation, as well as the Board of Regents of the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. She is also a member of the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured; the Board of Visitors of Georgetown University's School of Nursing and Health Studies; the Board of Directors of The Commonwealth Fund, the and Board of Directors of Ascension Health. She was elected to membership in the Institute of Medicine, National Academy of Sciences, National Academy of Public Administration, and to the American Academy of Nursing. Ms. Burke earned a master's degree in public administration from Harvard and a bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of San Francisco.

ROBERT BERENSON, M.D., is an institute fellow at the Urban Institute. He is an expert in health care policy, particularly Medicare, with experience practicing medicine, serving in senior positions in two Administrations, and helping organize and manage a successful preferred provider organization. Dr. Berenson recently completed a three year term on the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC), the last two as vice-chair. From 1998-2000, he was in charge of Medicare payment policy and private health plan contracting in the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Previously, he served as an assistant director of the Carter White House Domestic Policy Staff. His primary research and policy interests currently are in the areas of payment reform, provider and plan pricing power, quality improvement, performance measurement, and delivery system reform. Dr. Berenson is a board-certified internist who practiced for twenty years, the last twelve in a Washington, D.C. group practice, and while practicing helped organize and manage a successful preferred provider organization serving the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area. He was co-author, with Walter Zelman, of *The Managed Care Blues & How to Cure Them*, and, with Rick Mayes, *Medicare Prospective Payment and the Shaping of U.S. Health Care*. He is a graduate of the Mount Sinai School of Medicine, a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, and on the adjunct faculty of the George Washington University School of Public Health.

JULIETTE CUBANSKI, Ph.D., M.P.P., M.P.H., is associate director of the Program on Medicare Policy at The Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation. As a senior member of the Foundation's Medicare policy team, Dr. Cubanski helps to lead the Foundation's activities related to the Kaiser Project on Medicare's Future, a major Foundation initiative focused on producing timely and authoritative

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analysis of leading Medicare reform proposals and on informing the debate about the future of the Medicare program. As part of these efforts, Dr. Cubanski has coauthored two authoritative studies analyzing the cost and coverage effects of raising the age of eligibility for Medicare and restructuring Medicare's benefit design, as well as a major compendium of policy options to sustain Medicare for the future. Dr. Cubanski also has helped lead the Foundation's analytic efforts related to the Medicare Part D prescription drug benefit and how the private drug plan marketplace has evolved since its inception in 2006. In addition, she conducts research and analysis related to Medicare's long-term financial condition; the financial burden of health spending among Medicare beneficiaries; and Medicare beneficiaries with disabilities. Dr. Cubanski earned a Ph.D. in health policy at Harvard University, a Masters of Public Policy and a Masters of Public Health from the University of California, Berkeley, and a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of California at Los Angeles.

RAHUL RAJKUMAR, M.D., J.D., an internist, is the acting deputy director at the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation. Prior to arriving at CMS, Dr. Rajkumar was a consultant at McKinsey and Company, where he helped the senior management of leading hospitals and health care payers respond to national reform and the design and operational aspects of accountable care organizations. Dr. Rajkumar previously practiced hospital-based medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital, where he completed his residency training in Internal Medicine. Dr. Rajkumar holds a B.A. in History from Yale University, an M.D. from Yale School of Medicine and a J.D. from Yale Law School.
