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Universal Health Insurance: Can It Rise From the Dead?

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1. Will Congress enact universal health insurance coverage soon?

Things to think about:

- Representative Wyden's bill would increase federal spending by \$800 billion and the deficit by \$165 billion
- ➤ Medicare-for-all would increase federal spending <u>and</u> the budget deficit by a similar amount
- ➤ Do you think that there is <u>any</u> prospect of getting 60 votes in the Senate for such a bill?

2. Is state action likely?

- > How can you ask? *Its happening!*
- ➤ Many states are ready to move even without assistance
- With federal support; more would do so
 - waiver authority
 - limited financial support
 - protections for currently-served vulnerable populations

3. Will state actions prevent or delay federal action?


- State action is not an 'experiment';
 it is the first step to national reform
- ➤ 47 million languish uninsured, while the well-meaning (and well-insured!) in this town debate which millennial reform best meets their exacting standards
- Successful state reform will demonstrate that reform is *possible*—and that national action is *necessary*

4. Is support of state action good politics?



To Democrats:

- You have talked about achieving broader health insurance coverage for decades.
- Now you can do something to achieve it.
- Don't let a politically <u>improbable</u> ideal prevent you from making major progress.



To Republicans


- The public is getting frightened; you cannot go into an election empty-handed
