Medicare Advantage: Whose Cost, Whose Benefit? July 16, 2007

JOSEPH ANTOS is the Wilson H. Taylor scholar in health care and retirement policy at the American Enterprise Institute. He also serves as a commissioner of the Maryland Health Services Cost Review Commission and as an adjunct professor at the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Before joining AEI, Dr. Antos was the assistant director for health and human resources at the Congressional Budget Office. He also held senior positions in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Office of Management and Budget, and the President's Council of Economic Advisers. He has focused much of his research on the economics of health policy, including Medicare reform, health insurance regulation and the uninsured. Along with Alice Rivlin, he was the editor of *Restoring Fiscal Sanity 2007: The Health Spending Challenge* (Brookings Institution Press). Dr. Antos received his B.A. in mathematics at Cornell University and his M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from the University of Rochester.

KAREN IGNAGNI is president and CEO of America's Health Insurance Plans (AHIP), the trade association representing the nation's health maintenance organizations. Washingtonian Magazine named her one of the Top Three "Top Guns" of all trade association heads. Modern Healthcare magazine routinely ranks her among the 100 most powerful people in health care. Prior to joining one of AHIP's two predecessor organizations in 1993, Ms. Ignagni directed the AFL-CIO's Department of Employee Benefits. In the 1980s, she was a professional staff member of the U.S. Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, and earlier worked at the Committee for National Health Insurance and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Ms. Ignagni has written more than 90 articles on a wide range of health care policy issues, and appears regularly before congressional committees and on national newscasts. She sits on numerous boards and advisory groups, including the Board of the National Academy of Social Insurance, The Commonwealth Fund's Commission on Women's Health, the Partnership for Prevention, and the Bryce Harlow Foundation. Ms. Ignagni received her MBA from Loyola College's Executive Program.

JEANNE LAMBREW is an associate professor at George Washington University and this fall, will be joining the faculty of the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas at Austin. She is a senior fellow at the Center for American Progress, serves as the current chair of the Coalition for Health Services Research, and is a member of the Congressional Budget Office's Health Advisory Panel. Dr. Lambrew was a special assistant at the Department of Health and Human Services from 1993 to 1995 and then an assistant professor of public policy at Georgetown University in 1996. Subsequently, she worked as the program associate director for health at the Office of Management and Budget at the White House and as the senior health analyst at the National Economic Council from 1997 until 2000. She served on the board of AcademyHealth from 2003-07. She received her bachelor's degree from Amherst College and her masters and Ph.D. from the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

PETER ORSZAG is the director of the Congressional Budget Office, a post he assumed in January 2007. Before joining the CBO, Dr. Orszag was the Joseph A. Pechman senior fellow and deputy director of economic studies at the Brookings Institution where he served as the director of the Hamilton Project, director of the Retirement Security Project, and co-director of the Tax Policy Center. He served as special assistant to the president for economic policy and senior economic adviser at the National Economic Council from 1997-1998. He has coauthored numerous books, including *Protecting the Homeland 2006*/7 (2006), *Aging Gracefully: Ideas to Improve Retirement Security in America* (2006), and *Saving Social Security: A Balanced Approach* (2004). His main areas of research have been Social Security budget policy, pensions, macroeconomics, tax and budget policy, and higher education policy. Dr. Orszag graduated *summa cum laude* in economics from Princeton University and also obtained a M.Sc. and a Ph.D. in economics from the London School of Economics.

JOHN ROTHER is the policy and strategy director for the AARP. He is responsible for federal and state public policy formulation, and for policy research and analysis, across the broad range of issues that affect Americans 50 and older. He is expert on a wide range of issues, including Social Security, pensions, Medicare, private health insurance, Medicaid, long-term care, older workers, and consumer protection. Mr. Rother came to AARP in 1984, after four years as staff director of the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging under Chairman John Heinz (R-Pa). Prior to that, he was special counsel for health and labor for Senator Jacob Javits (R-NY). In 1996, he took a year-long sabbatical to study the future of the baby boomer generation. Mr. Rother serves on several boards and commissions, including the National Committee for Quality Assurance, the American Board of Internal Medicine Foundation, and The National Coalition on Health Care. He received his JD from the University of Pennsylvania Law School, where he edited the Law Review, after graduating with honors from Oberlin College.

DIANE ROWLAND is executive vice president of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation and the executive director of the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured. She is also an adjunct associate professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at Johns Hopkins University's School of Hygiene and Public Health. Dr. Rowland is an authority on Medicare, Medicaid, and health care for low-income, elderly, and disadvantaged populations, and has published widely on these subjects. Her federal health policy experience includes service on the staff of the Subcommittee on Health and the Environment of the House Committee on Energy and Commerce, as well as senior health policy positions in the Department of Health and Human Services and the former Health Care Financing Administration, now the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Dr. Rowland holds a bachelor's degree from Wellesley College, a master's degree in public administration from UCLA, and a doctor of science degree in health policy and management from Johns Hopkins.
