Consumer Choice in Health Care: How Could Reform Affect Our Choices? How Could We Make Better Choices?

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JOSEPH ANTOS is the Wilson H. Taylor Scholar in Health Care and Retirement Policy at the American Enterprise Institute (AEI). He also is a commissioner of the Maryland Health Services Cost Review Commission, and an adjunct professor at the School of Public Health of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Prior to joining AEI, he was assistant director for health and human resources at the Congressional Budget Office (CBO), and he held senior positions in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Office of Management and Budget, and the President's Council of Economic Advisers. He also has extensive experience as an adviser to the U.S. Agency for International Development, the World Bank, and governments in Europe and Asia. Dr. Antos has written, lectured, and testified before Congress on the economics of health policy, including Medicare and broader health system reform, health care financing, health insurance regulation, and the uninsured. He is the editor with Alice Rivlin of Restoring Fiscal Sanity 2007: The Health Spending Challenge (Brookings Institution Press, 2007). He is past chairman of the Coalition for Health Services Research, a member of CBO's panel of health advisers, and he serves on a variety of professional boards. He earned his Ph.D. in economics in 1974 from the University of Rochester, his M.A. in economics in 1971 from the University of Rochester, and his B.A. in mathematics from Cornell University in 1968.

DANIEL CALLAHAN was the co-founder of The Hastings Center, Garrison, N.Y., and its director and president from 1969 to 1996. The Hastings Center is a research and educational organization founded in 1969 to examine ethical issues of medicine, biology and the environment. Dr. Callahan is presently a senior researcher and president emeritus at the center. He is a senior scholar at Yale University's Institute of Politics and Policy Studies, and he has been a senior lecturer at the Harvard Medical School. He is also an honorary faculty member at the Charles University Medical School in Prague, the Czech Republic. He is an elected member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences; a former member of the Director's Advisory Committee at the Centers for Disease Control; and a member of the Advisory Council, Office of Scientific Integrity, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. He won the 1996 Freedom and Scientific Responsibility Award of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He was awarded the Centennial Medal of the Harvard Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 2006. He is the author or editor of more than 40 books. His research has covered a wide range of issues about health and the life span, although his most recent research has focused on ethics and health policy. Dr. Callahan received his Ph.D. in philosophy from Harvard, an M.A. from Georgetown University, and his B.A. from Yale.

TONY COELHO is chairman of the Partnership to Improve Patient Care and member of the board of directors of the Epilepsy Foundation. He also serves as chair of both Life Without Limits and the Committee on Disability Power & Pride. Mr. Coelho is a former six-term United States congressman and House majority whip from California. He was the primary author and sponsor of the Americans with Disabilities Act. He has also held positions with the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities, the U.S. Census Monitoring Board, and Vice President Al

Gore's 2000 presidential campaign. He has served on numerous corporate boards, including on the Business Advisory Board of Bender Consulting Services, a firm which creates competitive employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities. Rep. Coelho received his B.A. in political science from Loyola University of Los Angeles (now Loyola Marymount University).

UWE REINHARDT is the James Madison Professor of political economy and a professor of economics and public affairs at Princeton University, where he has taught since 1968. His teaching and research interests have centered primarily on health economics and policy; he has also written and taught on topics in accounting and finance. Professor Reinhardt has been a consultant to a wide range of business firms and government entities. In 2006 he was appointed by Governor John Corzine of New Jersey to chair the health reform commission for that state. He has served on the private sector National Leadership Commission on Health Care, and served for nine years on the Physician Payment Review Commission. He was president of the International Health Economics Association, the Association of Health Services Researchers (now AcademyHealth) and is a member of the Institute of Medicine, on whose Governing Council he served. Other groups that have benefited from his membership include: the National Advisory Board of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality; the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured; the World Bank External Advisory Panel for Health, Nutrition and Population; the National Institute of Health Care Management; and the coordinating committee of the Commonwealth Fund's International Program in Health Policy. Professor Reinhardt received his Ph.D. in economics from Yale University.
