## Speaker Biographies "Covering the Uninsured: Options for Reform"

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JACK EBELER is an independent consultant on federal health policy, focusing on Medicare and longer-term health reform. He is also a distinguished visitor at the O'Neill Institute on National and Global Health Law at Georgetown University. Previously, Mr. Ebeler was president and chief executive officer of the Alliance of Community Health Plans, senior vice president and the initial director of the Health Care Group at the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and deputy assistant secretary for planning and evaluation/health and then acting assistant secretary for planning and evaluation at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. He also held positions in health care consulting, managed care leadership, on Capitol Hill and at the Health Care Financing Administration (now CMS). Mr. Ebeler serves on the Health Care Services Board of the Institute of Medicine, the boards of Families USA and Inova Health System and the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission. He has an M.P.A. from the Kennedy School at Harvard University and a B.A. from Dickinson College.

BRADLEY HERRING is an assistant professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Bloomberg School of Public Health at the Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Herring's research focuses on a number of economic and public policy issues related to private and public health insurance – such as employment-based coverage, the individual health insurance market, Medicaid managed care, uncompensated care and policies aimed at reducing the number of uninsured. He has published articles in the *Journal of Health Economics, Health Services Research, Journal of Risk and Insurance* and *Health Affairs* and is co-author of the book *Pooling Health Insurance Risks*. Dr. Herring has received funding for his research from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development. He received his Ph.D. from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, was the recipient of a two-year RWJF Scholars in Health Policy fellowship at Yale University and served for a year with the White House's Council of Economic Advisers.

DIANE ROWLAND is executive vice president of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation and executive director of the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured. She is also an adjunct professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Bloomberg School of Public Health of the Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Rowland is an authority on health policy, Medicare and Medicaid, and health care for low-income, elderly, and disadvantaged populations, and has published widely on these subjects. Her federal health policy experience includes service on the staff of the Subcommittee on Health and the Environment of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, as well as senior health policy positions in the Department of Health and Human Services in the Office of the Secretary and the Health Care Financing Administration. Among many affiliations, she is a member of the Institute of Medicine, past president and fellow of the Association for Health Services Research, and has served as a national expert on the Governor's Health Reform Task Force in Louisiana. Dr. Rowland holds a bachelor's degree from Wellesley College, a master's in public administration from the University of California at Los Angeles and a doctor of science in health policy and management from the Johns Hopkins University.
