

Keeping the existing Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, and passing additional legislation to improve how it works§

Increasing federal funding to state governments to help pay for their Medicaid programs should be a top priority for congressional action§








Health care, recently a top-tier election issue, has moved into second tier amid competing issues

AMONG REGISTERED VOTERS: Percent who say each of the following issues will be the **most important** in deciding their vote for president:





2020 election was largely a referendum on Donald Trump


Is your vote mainly a vote ...?




Biden's immediate challenge: balancing economic recovery with controlling the pandemic

Limiting the spread of the coronavirus, even if it damages the economy


Limiting additional damage to the economy, even if it increases spread of the coronavirus
