








Key Executive Branch Organizations involved in Health Policy Development




The Department of Health & Human Services



Immediate Office of the Secretary

The Immediate Office of the Secretary is responsible for operations and coordination of the work of the Secretary



Staff Divisions

The primary goal of the Department's staff divisions is to provide leadership, direction, and policy and management guidance to the Department.

- Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)


Each OPDIV typically has their own leadership structures mimicking the structure of the Department (e.g., press shop, leg shop, external affairs, executive secretariat, etc)

- Getting things done requires an understanding of the organizational structure of the Cabinet and the Executive Office of the President (EOP), the ranks of key personnel, and the formal and informal ways they interact

The Cabinet


 The health policy work of the Department of Health and Human Services most frequently involves the following Cabinet members and Departments*



* HHS works with other Cabinet members and Departments on human services and science policy matters


Executive Office of the President


- The Executive Office of the President (EOP) consists of the immediate staff to the President, along with entities such as the Office of the Vice President, Office of Management and Budget, and the Council of Economic Advisors.
- Senior staff in the EOP include (in order of rank) Assistants to the President (APs), Deputy Assistants to the President (DAPs), and Special Assistants to the President (SAPs)
- The health policy work of the Department of Health and Human Services most frequently involves the following EOP agencies




White House Office


















External Affairs at HHS

- HHS
 - Intergov and External
 - Public Affairs
 - Legislative Affairs
 - Frankly, going straight to policy officials
- HHS Agencies/Operating Divisions
 - All have their own external affairs offices sometimes with consolidated functions
- Know the backgrounds of HHS appointees many have recent Hill experience – could be helpful

How HHS and its agencies communicate their upcoming priorities

- Formal ways that are pre-vetted:
 - ✓ speeches, proposed rules, interviews, Tweets, press releases
- Look for informal cues of what is to come
- Where?

✓ Sometimes the intel will come from the subagency officials and other times from "the 6th floor"

STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

Pressure points abound – assess the following:

- Which relevant: HHS, agency (front office or Center directors')
- Whether to go with targeted approach?
- How does your issue connect to Admin's key priorities
- Do you have an upcoming speaking opportunity OR a venue to recommend to HHS officials that helps HHS "tell their story" and to help promote your position or constituent company/organization.

Advantages to Regular Engagement with the Agencies

- Intel about future policies, events, personnel
- Opportunity to influence future policies
- Stakeholder engagement with constituents
- Impact on message development
- Inviting HHS policymakers to your District / State.
- Impact on future appointments (staff and for constituents)
